The following resources can be helpful for residents and businesses seeking assistance:

 FEMA – As a result of the disaster declaration approved by President Obama, all New York City boroughs are eligible for assistance through FEMA. FEMA can also be reached by going to its web site at www.disasterassistance.gov or calling (800) 621-3362. - City of New York Business Programs The City of New York's Department of Small Business Services and NYC Economic Development Corporation have launched a number of programs to assist businesses impacted by Sandy. They include:
 - o Emergency Loans of up to \$25,000 for small and mid-sized businesses.
 - Emergency sales tax letters to streamline procedures for reconstruction projects costing \$500,000 or more.
 - o Short-term swing office space at the Brooklyn Army Terminal.
 - A dedicated, SBS Business Outreach Team and Emergency Response Unit Large Scale Response Team for impacted businesses.
